

A lot Vs Allot Vs Alot

A lot

'A lot' refers to a large amount or number of **things** or **people**. It can be used to modify a **noun**, or as an **adverb** to mean 'very much' and 'very often'.

Modifying an noun

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| Example 1: | I need a lot of time to do this project. | [It will take a long time] |
| Example 2: | He needs a lot of help to finish this on time. | [He won't finish unless he gets help] |
| Example 3: | A lot of people have shown up today. | [There are many people here] |

Used as an adverb to mean 'very much' or 'very often'.

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| Example 1: | He looks a lot like my co-worker. | [He looks very much like my co-worker] |
| Example 2: | He likes exercising a lot . | [He likes exercising very often] |

Allot

'Allot' is a **verb**, which means to give or to distribute something.

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| Example 1: | I have allotted each team member a task. | [I have given each member a task] |
| Example 2: | I will allot the new computers to each group. | [Distribute the new computers] |
| Example 3: | I am allotting each group enough time to finish. | [Giving them enough time to finish] |

Alot

'Alot' does **NOT EXIST!** It is very often mistaken for 'a lot'. Therefore, please forget this word.
